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Studying Political Science under Open and Distance Learning

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The present publication is a revised version of the outcome of a research project entitled Teaching Political Science through Open and Distance Learning: A Comparative Study of Students' Support Services in Indian Universities.It is one of the pioneering attempts in exploring the teachinglearning process of a particular academic discipline being taught under distance mode. It may help one to understand not only the present scenario but also to identify the gaps between the promises and performances in this regard. In spite of certain limitations in absence of a broad-based empirical investigation, it definitely brings out the current status of the teaching-learning process in the discipline and provides 'clues' which may be regarded as 'eve-opener' to many among us. The fruits of the research may also be found very helpful to other social science disciplines and to the practitioners of the ODL as a whole. As such, the present work may be regarded as the starting point to refurbish all our attempts at quality assurance in ODL in India particularly in the field of social sciences and be treated as helpful to the students, teachers, researchers and policy-makers in general.
